Challenge Success is a non-profit school reform organization that works to improve K-12 student well-being, engagement, and belonging through our School Program, Research and Surveys, and Workshops.

Our unique approach is grounded in research about effective education and healthy child and adolescent development, engages and educates all stakeholders in the school community, and elevates the voice and perspective of all students. While many other organizations address student needs after problems arise, we offer upstream solutions that help to create systems within schools where students are engaged, healthy, and thriving.




Research sparks the idea for Challenge Success; convening of experts gets it off the ground. Early years are spent testing and refining our programs.

614 supporters from 18 states made financial contributions totaling \$845,500 to help fund our work with schools and families.

Students completed our survey in the 2022-2023 school year; Top sources of stress include workload, grades/assessments, lack of sleep, time management/procrastination, and future plans.

People registered for our events; Topics included restoring youth mental health, college admissions, pedagogy, and parenting.



# WELL-BEING, ENGAGEMENT, & BELONGING FOR ALL STUDENTS

In our surveys of 65,000 students this year, we saw increasing diversity in terms of race/ethnicity and gender identity. The pandemic has brought attention to the adolescent mental health crisis and lack of belonging and engagement for students, and we recognize that these issues span all demographics and are particularly acute for historically marginalized groups.

We believe that all students have assets to build on and sustain, and that when we center design on those most marginalized by the current system, all students benefit.


We are honored to partner with schools to use survey results to help create welcoming communities that affirm all students' identities. "This is so helpful and so powerful. Thank you so much.



### ELEVATED CONCERN FOR GIRLS AND STUDENTS WHO IDENTIFY AS LGBTQ+

We are particularly concerned about the higher rates of poor mental health and stress-related health symptoms for girls and students who identify as non-binary, transgender, unsure, or genderqueer / gender non-conforming. While many boys are also experiencing high levels of mental health issues, there may be reasons such as societal gender norms that makes it less likely for them to report their experiences (Arcand, M., Bilodeau-Houle, A., Juster, R. P., & Marin, M. F., 2023.) By focusing our efforts on those students who are reporting the highest levels of challenges, we can improve conditions in schools for students of all genders.



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



Donations \$835,500




#### **EXPENSES**


